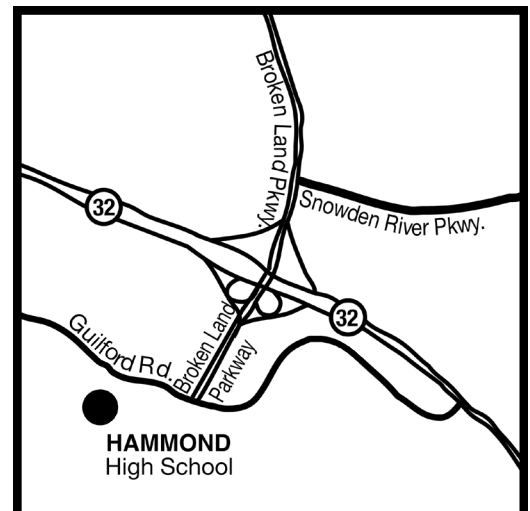

Accomplishments

Art Department participates in school, local, state, and national juried exhibitions; students maintain and restore Inner Harbor Carousel. Art Staff named High School Career Teacher of the Year by Maryland State Art Ed Association.

Dance Department - Students have been awarded and honored in the Maryland Distinguished Scholar in the Arts, The Washington Post Arts Scholars, and Maryland All State Dancers.

English Department - In 2008 and 2009, Hammond had a National Council of Teachers of English Achievement Award Winner in Writing. Students won a variety of writing contests on the local and state level.

ESOL Department - Consists of 53 students learning English who speak 8 different languages. The co-teaching model is used in American Government, Biology, English 10, Introduction to Ecological Systems, and Health.

Gifted and Talented Research Program Through technology and onsite visitations, students explore college/career interests, write knowledge-based papers supported by research, and present projects to classes and Student Learning Conference.

Math Department - Students at all grade levels compete countywide on our Math Team. Participation in the University of Maryland Mathematics Competition is high.

Music Department - Music ensembles perform and compete nationally receiving Excellent and Superior ratings at festivals and competitions. Ensembles include Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Marching Band, Jazz Ensemble, Orchestra, Concert Choir, Vocal Ensemble, and Guitar Ensemble.

Physical Education and Health Education - The Health education program certifies several hundred students in American Red Cross Adult CPR each year helping to make the Hammond High community a safer place to live.

Science Department - Instrumental in leading faculty toward technology as a teaching tool, encouraging students to individually participate in research programs.

Social Studies Department fosters civic responsibility through the Student Government Association, Mock Trial competition, Leadership courses, and Leadership U participation.

Special Education Department - Co-teaching gives students specialized instruction in a general education setting.

Theatre Department stages two productions annually. Advanced Theatre classes perform One Acts in May.
